Course Description:

- This is the third core course of the Embedded Certificate in Sustainability Studies and provides experiential learning experience through carrying out research projects. The research projects will link the understandings of sustainability gained in SUST 201 and SUST 401 with students' personal and career goals, while also introducing students to concepts, methods, and issues in sustainability research. Research projects will be rooted in real-life research scenarios and students will engage with sustainability practitioners outside of academia. Smaller assignments provide the scaffolding to successfully carry out the research project and opportunities to reflect on learning.
- Classes will include lectures, videos, discussions, student-led learning activities, and active participation in group work and learning activities. Students will be encouraged to engage in the course through asking questions and formulating their own ideas. There will be in-class work time during which students will discuss and receive feedback on their research projects from the instructor.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Describe the process of social research, and define and describe terms and methods associated with social research in sustainability.
2. Conduct social research on a sustainability topic, including reviewing literature, designing a study, collecting and analyzing data, and presenting findings in writing and orally.
3. Identify ethical risks in sustainability research with human participants (related to consent, fairness and equity, privacy and confidentiality, and conflicts of interest) and use strategies to mitigate and address these risks.
4. Discuss and reflect on quality, values, and participation in sustainability research with human participants.
5. Reflect on the relevance of the course topics in their personal and professional lives.
