Course Description:

This course is an introduction to architecture as an artistic and scientific endeavor, as well as an examination of its purpose and intentions, its processes, and its products. Students will develop an understanding of the social, cultural, historical, technological, economic, and natural context influencing the design of buildings and other human-made objects and environments. A range of guest lecturers and different types of assignments will expose the students to a wide variety of perspectives and practices, as well as offer an opportunity to explore basic design ideas and activities.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will acquire the following competencies:

- 1. Demonstrate a comprehensive understanding of the processes involved in the production of buildings by architects. This includes the ability to articulate the roles and responsibilities of architects, as well as those of architecture students.
- 2. Critically analyze and discuss contemporary issues within the field of architecture, drawing upon insights gained from class lectures, public events, and relevant news sources.
- 3. Identify, describe, and interpret key aesthetic, social, technological, and other pertinent attributes of various architectural structures through oral, written, and graphical means.
- 4. Proficiently represent and analyze a chosen spatial environment through graphical representations, enabling a deeper understanding of its architectural elements and spatial dynamics.
- 5. Engage in creative exploration and propose adaptive strategies space, demonstrating an understanding of how design interventions can enhance its functionality and user experience.

- Assessment and Evaluation Information:
 - Attendance and live participation for the entire duration of course assessments are mandatory (e.g., pin up review, midterm review, final review, exam, etc.) and must be completed in person unless otherwise stated. If a student is unable to participate live due to unforeseen circumstances, please inform the Course Instructor in advance. Missed assessments with a valid excuse, as defined by the University's guidelines (Section G.1.2) or with advance prior notification to the instructor, may be considered without penalty upon review of the student's attendance and participation record. Failure to be present for a course assessment as a result of an unexcused absence are grounds for failure in the course. You may be required to provide supporting documentation, as per <u>Section M.1</u> of the Academic Calendar to support your request.
 - During the semester, each student will participate in section/group discussions, produce an architectural manifesto exploring reasonings for being in design, give one short presentation in their tutorial discussion group, produce drawings representing an existing space/context, and one basic design project for that space/context. The manifesto will be a personal response to a summative question posed to the students, designed to have them critically reflect on their own relationships with and interests in the field of architecture. The short presentation will be a description and analysis of an architecturally significant building relative to the subject matter of the course, including annotated analysis diagrams of the building. While the existing context drawing will be of (a portion of) a space/context they consider interesting. There will also be participation in group discussions during tutorial sessions which will make up a part of the student's grade. More detailed handouts specific to each assignment will be given out during the semester.
- Attendance and Participation Expectations:
 - Students are expected to attend and come prepared to meaningfully engage in all class sessions. This includes producing or preparing content necessary for discussion and contributing to individual and class-wide discussions and/or conversations/assessments with the Course Instructor. Attendance shall be recorded at the commencement of every tutorial session.
 - Excused Absences: In the event of an exceptional circumstance (e.g., illness, bereavement, etc.) or an exceptional opportunity (e.g., varsity athletic competition, national conference or awards ceremony, pow wow, etc.) up to up to two excused absences are allowable per semester before jeopardizing one's own course grade and ability to pass the course. However, any such accommodations must be approved by the instructor with advance notice by the student.
 - Unexcused Absences: Attendance at all class sessions and participation in all assessments is mandatory. Unexcused absences in excess of one per semester are grounds for failure in the course.
 - Total Number of Absences: The combined total number of excused or unexcused absences per semester cannot exceed two per semester. Any number in excess are grounds for failure in the course.

- Guidelines for Submitting Assignments:
 - All assignments (e.g., projects, papers, presentations, etc.) must be turned in on time.
 - Late Assignments: Late assignments will lose a letter grade every 24 hours after the submission date/time. Late assignments submitted more than four days late constitute automatic failure. Late assignments with a valid excuse, as defined by the University's guidelines (Section G.1.2) or with advance prior notification to the instructor, may be considered without penalty upon review of the student's attendance and participation record. Please let your instructor know immediately if you cannot meet the deadlines specified. You may be required to provide supporting documentation, as per Section M.1 of the Academic Calendar to support your request.
 - Each assignment will be submitted digitally as a PDF and uploaded to the appropriate Dropbox on the course D2L site. Assignments are to be submitted on the specified due date and time.
