Introduction

An advanced studio exploring contemporary themes in planning and professional planning practice. Centres on a real world problem or client project; involves analysis, synthesis, and formulation of a physical planning or urban design solution. Culminates in a professional report and presentation. This studio provides an opportunity to apply skills and knowledge gained in previous coursework in the Master of Planning in a community context.

This section (B01) of EVDP 644 will work with the Bankview Community Association as the studio 'client'. Community engagement is an important studio component. Both a community engagement workshop and a public open house are part of this studio.

Objectives

- 1. To integrate and synthesize community information related to land use planning and urban design at different scales.
- 2. To gather, organize and analyze information to support planning and design decision-making.
- 3. To understand the dynamic inter-relationships among land use activities and built and spatial form.
- 4. To understand the temporal and spatial implications of changes in urban system processes.
- 5. To demonstrate an understanding of issue and context analysis in location specific problem solving.

Teaching Approach

Studio is a type of 'signature pedagogy' used in planning and design professional education to simulate professional problem solving situations. The purpose of a studio-based approach is to enable planning students to experience how professional planners think about problems and problem solving. The intention is to familiarize future professional planners with ways of thinking about and framing issues and information in problem solving and decision support within a municipal planning context. The studio

process and studio projects address the theme of Community Identity. Studio time will involve working on project specific tasks related to project development and presentation requirements and final report preparation. Participation in specific studio tasks may be both individual and collective as required. Tutorial appointments to discuss project tasks with the Instructor will be held regularly. A critical path approach will be used for project time management and milestone identification to enable coordinated task and project completion. A studio Teaching Assistant can assist with the application of software packages (such as AutoCAD, Sketch Up, InDesign, and Photoshop) to studio project work and presentation requirements.

Studio Project Parameters

This is not a policy or theory course. Studio projects independently explore neighborhood to city quadrant scales involving incremental and transformational change in timeframes from 5 years to 25 years. Studio projects must clearly identify a core set of issues and strategic challenges that can be represented spatially and result in physical form interventions

Studio Section B01Community Partner Winter 2018

The Community this section of EVDP 644 will be working with in Winter 2018 is Bankview. The Bankview Community Planning and Development Committee's initial proposal to the Federation of Calgary Communities (FCC) expressed concerns about successive land use re-designations by City of Calgary, such as the Bankview Village development. The Community Association would like to see re-development be more contextually sensitive to the existing physical and social context of Bankview. The Bankview Planning and Development Committee is concerned the City's "Main Streets" initiative is being used by City planners as the primary document in reviewing and approving re-designation and development as was the case Bankview Village. The Committee is concerned that unlike the Bankview APR, the City's Main Streets framework is relatively undefined and lacking in specific guidelines. The Community Association would like to start a dialogue with the City and their elected Councillor about the future identity of Bankview. The purpose would be to address the 'gap' between residents vision of the future of their community (including market realities such as the shortage of affordable housing, decreasing car ownership, and trend towards smaller units) and the City's plans to increase density in Bankview under the Municipal Plan and the Main Streets policy. The Community would prefer to see a review and update of their existing APR rather than deal with ongoing uncertainty of ad hoc, lot-by-lot incremental infill and redevelopment.

Two meetings have been held with Bankview's Planning and Development Committee to discuss the EVDP 644 Studio in Winter term 2018 based on their initial submission to the FCC. As there is only 12 - 13 weeks available in the Winter Term, the Committee recognizes it would not feasible to produce a new APR. However, they are interested in exploring the idea of Bankview's 'community identity' as a theme for EVDP 644 projects. This studio 'theme' involves thinking about Bankview's boundary conditions, land use mix, maintaining and enhancing the community's amenities and green space system, creating an inventory of vacant lots and 'lost spaces' and potential future uses, improving visual legibility, vehicular and non-vehicular circulation connectivity, maintaining and maximizing topographc view lines, improving streetscapes, identifying scenarios for land use mix

and spatial organization. This theme should be sufficiently broad enough to encompass a lot of variety in studio project choices and products.

The following weekly studio schedule provides specific dates and approximate timelines for the following stages of the studio:

> TASK 1: Weeks 1-3

Understanding Bankview's history and current circumstances to include data collection, information gathering, community mapping, spatial pattern identification, and critical insights into

Issues affecting the future urban dynamics of Bankview and its boundary areas.

➤ TASK 2: Weeks 5-6 + 8 [Note: Week 7 (Feb.19-23) is Reading Week – NO Classes]

Project identification – Scenario Development – Strategic Questioning and Preparation for Community engagement workshop with the Bankview Community Association.

> TASK 3: Weeks 9-14

Projects and project outcomes finalized and studio work to complete project work and final presentation development, Open House Posters and the final studio report. Project specific consultation with individuals recommended by Bankview's Planning and Development Committee will be scheduled when possible and weekly desk 'crits'/tutorials scheduled with Instructor and TA will be set up.

Studio Attendance

Participants are expected to be present and available for all scheduled studio days. Absence from studio for more than three consecutive studio days without the knowledge and agreement of the Instructor will result in a required meeting with the Instructor. Studio participants are also expected to attend individual or group studio 'crits' and/or tutorial appointments as scheduled on time and with the work required for review with the Instructor. Failure to participate in scheduled tutorials will result in a required meeting with the Instructor.

Studio Event Attendance outside of Scheduled Studio time

Due to the relationship EVDP 644 Section B01 with a specific Community Association partner, it is necessary to hold some events involving our Community partner outside of scheduled studio time. Specifically, the Community engagement workshop, Community Association evening meetings, and the final Public Open House will be off campus and outside studio time. Because these events are an important part of the studio; all studio participants are expected to make the necessary arrangements to attend these events.

Evaluation of Studio Group Work

Some work tasks assigned in studio may involve working in a group. The instructor will evaluate group work based on individual contributions to group work assignment.

Grading Scale

Final grades shall be reported as letter grades, with the grade point value as per column 2. Final grades shall be calculated according to the 4-point range in column 3. For evaluation of individual assignments by percentage grades, the grade equivalent percentage equivalents shown in column 4 shall be used.
